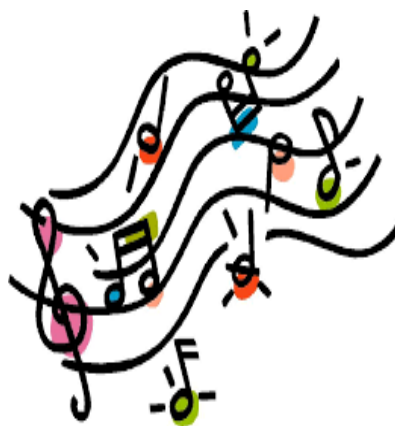

ICT News

Office 365 - coming soon!

Our school will shortly be expanding the current email service offered to students with additional services, and this will be known as LearnLink Office 365.

LearnLink Office 365 is a customised package of Microsoft Office 365, tailored for the South Australian public education system, and is offered at no additional charge to parents/guardians whilst their student remains enrolled at Gawler & District College.

When LearnLink Office 365 is enabled, families of students attending Gawler & District College (GDC) will be able to use the service online. Also, via their home Internet service, they will be able to download licenced versions of common Microsoft Office applications used in teaching and learning for no charge, and use them after installation without an internet connection. They will also have their own online storage space for files that can be shared with other students and teachers.

Daymap Connect – Parent Portal

In Week 1 of this term, the Daymap Parent Portal was activated. The Daymap Parent Portal is an extension of the Daymap Learning Management System which provides parents with access to key school and student information both at home and on the go. It's an easy-to-use system which allows parents to create and manage their own accounts for Daymap Connect, requiring only one login and password per parent (with the option to provide multiple logins) to access details for all of your children enrolled in the school.



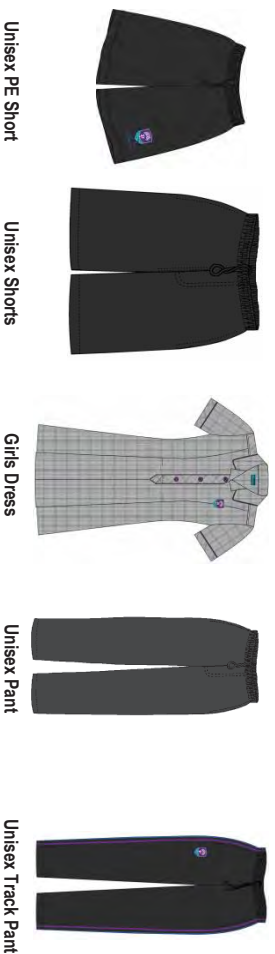
